Executive Summary

2021 was a very busy year for the Wildwood City Fire Department. WFD members responded to 4,409 emergency incidents, which is the highest one year total in our Department's history. Members completed 5,020 fire safety inspections and continued to expand our community outreach programs. Although still in the COVID-19 pandemic, we began to have a return of some normalcy with many special events taking place throughout the year. The department continues to look forward to providing the very best in Fire, Rescue and EMS services to our municipality while being fiscally responsible to the people we serve. We will continue to live out our mission, vision, and core values on a daily basis to ensure that we do just that.

Services Provided

Being able to provide a variety of specialized services, not customary to most fire departments, is what sets our department apart from others within our county.

The Wildwood City Fire Department continues to offer open water rescue responses during the "shoulder season" for our island community when the beach patrol is no longer in service. We also continue to support the A.L.E.R.T. (After-hours Lifeguard Emergency Response Team) in conjunction with the Wildwood Beach Patrol's unit in the summer evening hours when the beaches are closed.

The Wildwood City Fire Department is the lead agency for the Cape May County Regional Urban Search & Rescue team. This team specializes in Structural Collapse Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, High-Angle Rope Rescue, Surface Ice and Water Rescue and Trench Rescue. In, 2021 the team

responded to 9 emergency incidents. The team completed 72 hours of monthly-based core discipline training in various technical rescue disciplines as well as additional training.

Training

The Officers and Firefighters of the Wildwood City Fire Department continuously further their education through officer development classes and tactical courses. Training and being prepared for the unknown is always at the forefront of our department.



During the 2021 calendar year the department conducted several in-house training programs to maintain skills in various certification disciplines including but not limited to;

- Fire Officer 1 Pro-Board Certification course
- Fireground Size-Up by Jersey City FD Deputy Chief (Ret.) Mike Terpak
- Open Water Rescue
- Pride & Ownership and Sweating the Small Stuff by Chief Rick Lasky (Ret.) Lewisville, TX

In addition to the classes held in-house members spent hundreds of hours participating in fire, rescue and emergency medical training throughout the year.

Equipment and Funding Opportunities

Through our Community Risk Assessments, the Wildwood City Fire Department continues to try and be well equipped and trained in order to provide the very best in emergency services for our residents and visitors. Being an urban city on an island with a tremendous tourist base in the busy summer season makes our municipality vulnerable.

The Wildwood City Fire Department has been very fortunate over the past several years to receive numerous grants that have helped us successfully fulfill our mission. These include two Federal Emergency Management (FEMA) Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response grants, Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG), United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Economic Impact Initiative for Purchase of Fire Equipment grant, and the Lt. Joseph P. DiBernardo (Joey D) Foundation grant.

In 2021, the Wildwood City Fire Department applied for a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Assistance to Firefighter Grant. Since 2001, the AFG grant program has helped firefighters and other first responders obtain critically needed resources necessary for protecting the public and emergency personnel from fire and related hazards. The Wildwood City Fire Department has been very fortunate over the years in being awarded several AFG grants. In 2021, we were extremely fortunate to be awarded this grant.

The grant awarded was for \$230,000.00, which was for the purchase of new, firefighter friendly, all-band radios. These radios are specifically designed for the rigors of firefighting and incorporate the latest technology. These radios will greatly enhance our communications with our mutual aid partners and provide for a greater degree of safety for our members.

In addition, in 2021 the Department applied for a Leary Firefighter's Foundation grant to fund the purchase of a new turnout gear washer/extractor. We were very humbled to be notified that we had been chosen to receive a grant and are expecting to take delivery of the new washer sometime in 2022.

Our Department continues to actively seek and aggressively pursue any available grant funding that saves money for our taxpayers while at the same time improving the overall health and safety of our members. This also results in our Department having the most technologically advanced equipment available which increases our efficiency and abilities to respond as an All-Hazards emergency response organization.

New Vehicle Delivery

During 2021, the Wildwood City Fire Department was very fortunate to place a new Polaris UTV in service. This unit replaced a 2007 model that was reassigned to the City's Beach Patrol. This unit, along with the ASAP UTV, which was placed in service in 2020, greatly enhances our beach operations and ability to cover the multitude of beach events that we staff each year.

The largest special event staffed by WFD members during 2021 was the inaugural Barefoot County Music Festival. This four-day event featured some of country music's hottest and talented artists. Headliners for the show included Lee Brice, Dan + Shay, Carrie Underwood, and the Zac Brown Band. The event was a huge success and a great event that benefited businesses throughout the island. During the four-days, Wildwood Firefighters had 195 patient contacts, the majority of which were for minor cuts and scrapes requiring bandages. Only 5 patients required transport to the hospital over the four days. This event once again showcased all that the City of Wildwood has to offer in a safe, family oriented venue.





Message from the Chief

It is our department's commitment to provide the highest level of professional services to the public by protecting lives, property and the environment. It is important for our stakeholders, both internally and externally, to understand this. The purpose of this report is to provide that insight and the accomplishments of the fire department during the past year and to highlight the many services and activities that support our community.

2021, was yet another challenging year for the Wildwood City Fire Department as we continued to navigate through a global

pandemic while responding to the largest call volume in the department's history. As businesses reopened and restrictions lessened, the City saw an increase in tourism and the return of most special events previously held in the city. In addition to returning events, the City hosted several new ones including the Barefoot Country Music Fest, which drew well over 100,000 people, from all over, to our great City over a four-day period. The Wildwood City Fire Department played an instrumental role in the success of this event as we staffed and coordinated all Emergency Medical and Fire Services during the event.

Responding to emergencies remains our core mission. The department responded to the largest number of calls in our department's history. In the calendar year 2021, the Wildwood City Fire Department responded to 4,409 emergency calls for service. Emergency Medical Service (EMS) calls accounted for 2,597 of those responses. Fire type calls accounted for 1,812 of the emergencies handled. Customer service is our number one goal, and no matter the interaction, all of our members strive to provide the highest level of service possible.

Through a continued and aggressive campaign toward grant funding and other funding opportunities, our department was able to secure (3) grants worth over \$348,000.00 in 2021. However, these grants and the high level of service that we are able to provide to our citizens, visitors, and neighbors would not be possible without the continued commitment and support of our governing body and our community. I would like to thank Commissioner of Public Safety, Steve Mikulski for his unwavering support for our department along with Mayor Pete Byron, Commissioner Krista Fitzsimons, and our incredible community, who make the city worth serving.

The Wildwood City Fire Department continues to be a service driven recognized leader in providing emergency services with our resources and a healthy, highly trained and motivated workforce. However, understanding that there is more to the fire service than responding to emergencies, the department continues to remain heavily engaged in the community and has developed a strong working relationship with our school district and youth organizations to help guide and prepare our youth under the concept that "Failure is not an option"! As we look forward, our aim is to continue growing and exceed your expectations.

It is my honor to present the 2021 Annual Report, which reflects our dedication and commitment to the citizens of the City of Wildwood as well as our visitors and neighbors. 

About Us

The City of Wildwood is a 1.3 square mile seashore resort City that is a popular summer tourist destination for hundreds of thousands of visitors each year. As of the 2020 census the City has a population of 5,157 which can swell to 250,000 or more during the peak summer season. The City is famous for its large boardwalk with numerous shops, restaurants, amusement piers and waterparks and for being home to the World's largest, finest, and safest bathing beach. The City is home to many hotels/motels, apartment/rooming houses, bed and breakfasts, restaurants, bars/nightclubs, as well as many condos and single family residences.

The City of Wildwood has a combination-type Fire Department consisting of a career division and a volunteer division. The Department is led by the Career Fire Chief who has overall responsibility for the administration of the Department. In addition to the Fire Chief there is a Deputy Fire Chief, who along with the Fire Chief, handles administrative and operational duties. The career division consists of 4 platoons with a Captain and 4 firefighters assigned to each platoon. In addition, the career division is supplemented by a volunteer duty-crew member and also part-time seasonal staff to increase staffing levels during the busy summer season. The Fire Prevention Bureau is headed by the Fire Official and has one full-time and one part-time fire inspector assigned. The Volunteer Division consists of the Holly Beach Fire Company # 1 and the Wildwood Fire Company # 1. The Volunteer Battalion Chief is the highest ranking volunteer officer responsible for both companies. The City of Wildwood Fire Department is an all-hazards response organization providing fire suppression, emergency medical services (Basic-Life Support Transport), technical/heavy rescue (high-angle rope rescue, confined space rescue, vehicle extrication, open water rescue, surface ice rescue, hazardous material and trench rescue response), fire prevention, code enforcement and emergency management services.

The City of Wildwood Fire Department protects the municipality with 1-Squad Company, 1-Quint Company, 1-Rescue Company and 1-Engine Company, 4 BLS Ambulances and several support vehicles including a water rescue/utility vehicle for the beach and several 5 ton high-water vehicles. In 2021, the City of Wildwood responded to over 4,400 emergency incidents.

The City of Wildwood Fire Department is proud to have an ISO Class 3 designation and we continuously strive to better that classification.

Facilities and Apparatus

The City of Wildwood Fire Department maintains facilities and apparatus to ensure timely and efficient responses to emergencies. The department has three stations that cover responses for the city although Station's 3-1 and 3-2 are currently not operating for fire responses.

Fire Stations:

Fire Headquarters - 4400 New Jersey Avenue

Headquarters is located within the City Hall building, between City Hall and the Police Department. The offices of the Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief and the Fire Prevention Bureau are all located on the second floor of Headquarters. Administrative staff for the Fire Chief's Office and the Fire Prevention Bureau are located here as well. The City's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is also located at Fire Headquarters.

The Career Division firefighters are located in Headquarters on the first floor. The on-duty platoon handles all emergencies called into the City of Wildwood Fire Department with the following apparatus being assigned to Headquarters:

2017 – 2000 GPM Pierce Squad (first due apparatus)

2014 - 2000 GPM E-One Quint

2020 - Ferrera Heavy Rescue

2007 – Dodge Ram 2500 (beach response apparatus)

Two – BLS Transport Ambulances (first due)

2020 - Medstat ASAP UTV (special event EMS unit)

Station 3-1 - 4310 Washington Avenue (Holly Beach)

Station 3-1 is located directly across from Fire Headquarters and houses the volunteer division of the department. Although we currently do not utilize this building for fire responses it still houses reserve equipment. The company members of this station still hold their monthly meetings and maintains the charter of the company which was organized in 1884. The station currently houses the following apparatus:

2002 – Chevy utility vehicle (Fire Police)

2010 – Army cargo 5-ton vehicle (flood responses-fire suppression)

2009 – Army cargo 5-ton vehicle (flood responses-fire suppression)

2010 - Army cargo 5-ton vehicle (flood responses-evacuations)

Two - BLS Transport Ambulance (reserve/special events)

Station 3-2 – 111 East Pine Avenue (Pine Avenue)

Station 3-2 is located in the northern-end of the city and houses the volunteer division of the department. Although we currently do not utilize this building for fire responses it still houses reserve equipment. The company members of this station still hold their monthly meetings and maintains the charter of the company which was organized in 1896. The station currently houses the following apparatus:

Operations

The fire department operations division is managed by Deputy Fire Chief Daniel Dunn. Operations is the largest division of the fire department. Operations personnel respond to all requests for service.

In addition, personnel also continually conduct mandatory training requirements, assist in public education, conduct fire prevention inspections supporting the inspection

bureau and maintain the fire stations and apparatus.

The ability to improve our service is generated through many ideas and initiatives that originate from the operational members. Their values, energy, commitment and compassion drive many of the departments' functions, programs and activities throughout the year. The operations personnel are faced daily with accomplishing our mission to provide extraordinary service to the community.





Fire Prevention Bureau



The Bureau of Fire Prevention is headed by Fire Official William Cripps. Firefighter Mark Allen is detailed to the bureau as a Fire Inspector. During the busy summer season 2 part-time Fire Inspectors are hired to assist with the inspection work load. The Bureau is currently short one season inspector. The personnel of the Bureau focus on all aspects of life safety. Their primary objective is to reduce preventable deaths, injuries and property loss through

public education programs, fire inspections of all commercial and non-owner occupied occupancies and through enforcement of the New Jersey Uniform Fire Code. The office also oversees NJ State Housing Inspections.

The Bureau educates building owners and tenants while conducting fire safety inspections. This helps to gain voluntary compliance, as well as limit the number of repeat violations in the future. The fire inspectors conduct annual fire safety inspections of existing commercial properties each year which may result in follow-up inspections to ensure compliance.

Training & Education

The Wildwood City Fire Department continues to maintain a high level of commitment and dedication to training. The city presents a unique geographic make-up with a number of high community risks to include high-rise buildings, confined spaces, amusement rides and open bodies of water. Over the years, the fire service has evolved into an "all hazards" approach agency with the Wildwood City Fire Department being no exception. Firefighters are the initial responders to all water related emergencies to include, but not limited to, the bay, the beach during periods that the Lifeguards are off-duty, tidal flooding and natural disasters.

Since the Wildwood City Fire Department embraces the "all hazards" approach our firefighters are highly trained to not only respond to the community's needs but to mitigate the hazards that are present. Members of the department spent well over 3,000 hours in over 100 topics in education in 2021. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many of the training courses were offered virtually which our members took advantage of. Our members adapted and overcame to ensure that our training and education didn't miss a beat throughout the year.

Special Units

Cape May County Regional Urban Search & Rescue Team

The Regional Urban Search & Rescue Team (CMC USAR) is a highly specialized team of fire department members trained in structural collapse rescue, confined space rescue, high-angle rope rescue, surface ice/water rescue and trench rescue. The team is a county asset that responds to any such emergencies in Cape May County. The team also responds mutual aid to other Southern New Jersey counties as requested. The team is led by WFD Capt. Matthew Johnson who serves as the Cape May County ESF-9 Search & Rescue Coordinator. In 2021, the team completed 72 hours of monthly-based core discipline training in the areas of confined space rescue, rope rescue, collapse rescue, and water rescue. In addition to the monthly training, the team was fortunate enough to bring in third party instructors to conduct trench rescue refresher training and training on the Arizona Vortex, which is a new piece of equipment the team, placed in service for rope and confined space rescue operations.



The most notable and significant response for the team occurred on September 1-2, 2021 during Hurricane Ida. On September 1st the team was dispatched to Mullica Hill where a tornado resulted in several collapsed structures. The team responded and staged but were later released as all occupants of the homes had been accounted for. The team was then notified to respond to Mercer County for a swiftwater flood rescue assignment. Team members deployed and operated in Mercer and Somerset Counties for over 24 hours. The locations included Lawrencville in Mercer County and Manville in Somerset County which were some of the hardest hit areas by the historic flooding. During this time, team members conducted 264 rescues and evacuations and also assisted 42 pets.





Notable Response

Captain Matthew Johnson, who heads the CMC USAR team, is also a member of the State of New Jersey Urban Search and Rescue team, New Jersey Task Force 1 (NJ-TF1). As a member of NJ-TF1, Captain Johnson was deployed with the team to the disastrous Surfside, Florida condo building collapse that occurred on June 24, 2021. Capt. Johnson, along with his NJ-TF1 teammates worked at the site searching the rubble pile for two weeks. Unfortunately, no additional survivors were found. 98 people lost their lives and 11 more were injured in this tragedy. The Cape May County Board of Commissioners subsequently honored Capt. Johnson for his response to this disaster. The officers and members of the Wildwood City Fire Department commend Capt. Johnson for his dedication to serve not just only Wildwood and Cape May County but our entire country and beyond. WFD Firefighter Rich Harron also serves as a member of NJ-TF1 and responded with the team for Hurricane Ida.

Office of Emergency Management



Deputy Fire Chief Daniel Dunn heads the Office of Emergency Management (O.E.M.) for the City of Wildwood. The mission of the Emergency Management Division is to develop plans and procedures that provide effective responses to all threats facing the City of Wildwood. By developing and exercising the all-hazards plans we strive to minimize the impacts of an emergency or disaster on our citizens, visitors, property, the environment and the City of Wildwood.

The Emergency Management Division works closely with public and private sector partners to ensure we are able to coordinate during an emergency or disaster. This coordination requires planning and close relationships with local, county, state and federal partners.

During 2021, the Wildwood City Office of Emergency Management completed a partial update of the City's Emergency Operations Plan. Constant review and updating of this plan allows the City to be ready in the event of a disaster or emergency that requires the implementation and activation of various emergency support functions. The updated plan was submitted to the Cape May County OEM and State of New Jersey OEM for approval.

Another major undertaking, started in 2020, was the 5-year update to the City of Wildwood's Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP). The plan identifies mitigation strategies that the City plans to utilize or develop to mitigate the effects of various natural and manmade hazards. The City's OEM worked closely with the Cape May County OEM and Tetra Tech who was contracted to assist in the plan update process. The draft plan was finalized and formally adopted by the City of Wildwood Board of Commissioners on June 9, 2021.

The Office of Emergency Management administers the CodeRed community notification program. This program enables residents and visitors to sign up to receive a phone call or text message in the event of an emergency or natural disaster such as hurricanes, flooding, snow storms or nor'easters. In 2021, the OEM had to send out 7 emergency notifications for 5 significant weather events that included coastal tidal flooding and storms. Two general notifications were also sent out regarding community COVID-19 vaccination sites.

With much of the city being low-lying areas, any time there is the possibility for flooding this system allows city officials to immediately contact those who have signed up for the notifications to be briefed on the latest projections of approaching storms.

We also continuously research and implement new initiatives delivering important fire and life safety messages through various outlets to the citizens, visitors and our business community.



September 11th is always remembered by the members of the fire department with the effect it had on our country and the fire service as a whole. In addition to working with the Business Improvement District (B.I.D) in 2021 to host the 5th Annual September 11th memorial service at the Byrne Plaza, Captain James Grauel coordinated the 5th annual Wildwood September 11th Memorial Stair Climb. Each participant pays tribute to a FDNY firefighter by climbing or walking the equivalent of the 110 stories of the World Trade Center. The stair climb was held at Sandman Towers in previous years. However, once again, due to the pandemic we had to adapt and overcome. The stair climb was held with climbers being able to climb at various locations. Many of the WFD members completed the event on the bleachers at Maxwell Field. Some members completed the climb at Morey's Raging Waters on Mariners Landing Pier. Capt. Jim Grauel and Firefighter Darrick Kobierowski completed a 24-hour continuous stair climb to raise money for the Tunnel to Towers Foundation. The event raised over \$15,000.00 for the foundation. This foundation, created in memory of FDNY Firefighter Stephen Siller who was killed in the line of duty on 9/11/01, supports the families of fallen first responders and veterans, as well as those catastrophically injured in the line of duty.





2021 Revenue

The Wildwood City Fire Department offsets many of the costs associated with the services we provide through various fees and permits. The department contracts with a billing agency to administer the fee collection associated with ambulance services.

The fire prevention fees are collected "in-house" with our administrative support staff located in Fire Headquarters.

In 2021, the Wildwood City Fire Department collected a total of \$770,228.95.

Achievements: 2021

- Applied for Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) funds to purchase new all-band portable radios for all of our personnel. Awarded grant for \$230,000.
- Applied for a Leary Firefighters Foundation grant for a new turnout gear washer/extractor. Awarded grant for the purchase.
- Implemented new ESO Fire Reporting software for recording National Fire Incident (NFIRS) data.
- Implemented a comprehensive pre-planning program utilizing new software, ESO Properties to increase pre-fire and emergency intelligence for all personnel.
- Implemented a new Fire Officer Development program for all personnel.
- Implemented a Firefighter Cancer Prevention Program within the department.
- Conducted in-house Pro-Board Fire Officer 1 certification course.
- Continued and expanded all of our community outreach programs including the Adopt-A-School program.
- Completed a swim training program for all personnel as established by Firefighter Darrick Kobierowksi.
- Acquired many new technical rescue tools and equipment through the CMC USAR team.
- Successfully staffed the Barefoot County Music Festival
- FMBA Local # 50 partnered with VFW to support the construction of a Gold Star Families monument to be constructed in North Wildwood.
